

WORKING GROUP ON TRADITIONAL AND LOCAL OCEAN KNOWLEDGE


The period of the Working Group will be for two years with consideration of another two-year extension.

Objectives and expected outputs/outcomes

The overarching goal of the WG is to promote and incorporate traditional and local knowledge of the ocean in communities, particularly in coastal communities, into Ocean Literacy Action Programs to realize Outcome 7th of the ocean decade

Objectives:

- Networking and inventorying of local communities' and traditional peoples' knowledge connected to ocean;
- 2) Developing and exchanging showcases and lesson learned based on the success stories of local communities' and traditional peoples' knowledge connected to ocean;
- 3) Building a strategic action programs of 5 years ocean literacy action based on local example/showcase to encourage communities changing their practices and habits, helping the conservation of ecosystems, biodiversity and human health to improve ocean health, as well as promoting their traditional knowledges and best practices in pro-ocean activity.

Expected outputs/outcomes

- 1) Publication on local communities' and traditional people's knowledge connected to ocean;
- 2) Report of the workshop on the current regional status of traditional and local ocean knowledge in the region;
- Publication on showcase and lesson-learned based on traditional and local ocean knowledge;
- 4) Proceeding from selected presented papers by participants from each member country of WG;
- 5) Project proposal for 2025-2030;
- 6) Annual Report document;
